Being a mature student, in my second year of reading music, I have learnt more during the week at the Spanish Renaissance course than in my two years of undergraduate, so far. Such "jam packed" days with a wonderful variety of repertoire which is what I had hoped my degree would resemble. The coaching was in depth and highly specific which really meant that small details weren't overlooked during the course.

The twelve hour days of, what I can only liken to heaven, meant that your brain and stamina are challenged which are all vital parts of learning to become a professional musician.
